## Necrological Circular.

Of late years, special pains have been taken to prepare and preserve suitable memoirs of the deceased Alumni of Hamilton College. At each annual meeting of the Society of Alumni, the Necrologist reads biographical sketches, as complete as may be, of all members known to have departed life during the year. These sketches are printed and preserved among the Society's records.

It is believed that this feature of the Society meets the approval of its members, and that they and their friends will respond to any call from the Necrologist for aid in making his annual reports complete and reliable. In furnishing materials for obituary notices, attention is asked to the following points:

1. State the full name of deceased, with date and place of birth, and such facts respecting parentage as will have a general interest.
2. State such facts and incidents as are worthy of record during the under-graduate course of the deceased.
3. Sketch his after-graduate career, with notices of professional study and labor, or business engagements. Name the offices of honor and trust held by the deceased: add a list of the books, speeches and pamphlets of which he was the author.
4. State facts in domestic history: to whom married, and when: number of children, &c.
5. Give an account of decease, with an analysis of character, social, mental and religious.
6. If convenient, send such newspaper notices as have appeared. In many cases these published notices will give all the information asked for, under the above specifications.

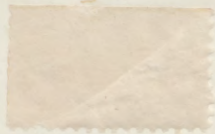
